



# BECOME A SUPERBAGGER

DO's	DON'Ts
Load bag racks with only two to three wickets of bags.	<b>DON'T</b> overload bag racks. This causes bags to stick together.
Build walls inside bags. Fill the middle of the bag with glass items or other smaller items.	<b>DON'T</b> place glass items next to each other in bags.
Fill bag with at least 6 items depending on size and weight.	<b>DON'T</b> overstuff bags or leave bags half-full.
Bag meat and perishable items together. Bag dry goods and pantry items together.	<b>DON'T</b> scatter meat and perishable items in several different bags.
Keep large bulky items (milk jugs, detergent, and diapers) out of bags unless the customer asks for you to bag them.	<b>DON'T</b> argue with what the customer wants. Bag these items if they want you to do so.
Bag eggs and bread together.	<b>DON'T</b> bag eggs or bread with heavy items.
Bag 2-liter drinks laying down (one facing left and one right) and tie off the bag so they won't fall over.	<b>DON'T</b> place more than three 2-liter bottles in a bag.
Use one bag at a time.	<b>DON'T</b> bag cleaners and other items that don't mix with food.
Certain items – like household cleaners – don't mix well with food. Pack them separately.	<b>DON'T</b> pack household cleaners and similar items with food.
Place tall items in the back (or front) of the bag so you do not block the handles.	<b>DON'T</b> pack bags so that they are hard for a customer to carry.
